



The border of this suzani, or dowry embroidery, is very similar to those on one in the M.H. de Young Museum, San Francisco, see *Hali*, issue 30, pl. 4, p.48 and another in the Vok collection, see Ignazio Vok, *Suzani*, Munich 1994, pl. 30. This embroidery's field design is not the in-and-out design of the de Young piece and others, such as lot 26, Sotheby's London 26 April 1995, but has asymmetric ascending floral vinery that is a denser version of that found on the cited Vok embroidery.

CATALOGUE NOTE

The highly stylized and eccentric drawing of stars and other design motifs in this rug show that it is the work of a village weaver. In color palette and elements such as the ivory inner and star-filled octagon borders this rug recalls 4-1-4 design Bergama rugs, for examples, see Sotheby's New York, 30 May 1986, lot 72 and 22 September 1993, lot 98. The overall design scheme, however, appears to be a very personal and individual composition, with very distant echoes of early Anatolian rugs such as those with the Holbein design, see Şerare Yetkin, *Historical Turkish Carpets*, Istanbul, 1981, pl. 39.

CATALOGUE NOTE

Frank M. Bernardin (1867-1953) was president of the BR Electric Company and a member of the Board of the Kansas City Art Institute.

The pristine condition of the present rug is a testament to the esteem with which it has been held through the years. Dark blue ground Marasali Shirvan prayer rugs with rows of varying flaming *boteh* as found here are not uncommon, however, the isolated single foliate motif enclosed by the arch in this rug appears to be unusual. The use of a stylized beetle or insect border is another characteristic of this rug that sets it apart among the known corpus of Marasali weavings.

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

CATALOGUE NOTE

Seven-sided or heptagonal asmalyks such as this are a more rare format in Yomud weaving than those with five sides, such as lot 50 in this catalogue. Three heptagonal examples with a similar diagonal serrated lattice design to this asmalyk are one from the Straka collection now in the Textile Museum, see Jerome Straka and Louise Mackie, eds., *The Oriental Rug Collection of Jerome and Mary Jane Straka*, Washington, D.C., 1979, pl. 9; another in the Museum of Ethnography, St. Petersburg, see Elena Tzareva, *Rugs and Carpets from Central Asia*, Leningrad, 1984, fig. 77 and that in Werner Loges, *Turkoman Tribal Rugs*, London, 1980, pl. 46. An unusual characteristic of this particular asmalyk is the top border which changes in design and coloring from the side and lower borders as in a five sided asmalyk from the collection of Arthur J. Arwine, published in Louise W. Mackie and Jon Thompson, *Turkmen Tribal Carpets and Traditions*, Washington, D.C., 1980, pl. 75.



CATALOGUE NOTE

This highly unusual Axminster rug reflects European interest in Turkish art and culture in the 18th century. Europeans had been fascinated with the Orient for centuries but in the late 1700s, with the weakening of the Ottoman Empire as a result of its expulsion from Central Europe in the late seventeenth century, westerners started to view Anatolia with curiosity more than concern. The Franco-Ottoman alliance in 1715 established the fashion for 'turquerie' in France and pseudo-Turkish characteristics began to appear in every segment of European life from fashion to music. The immense success of Mozart's operas The Abduction from the Seraglio and Zaide illustrate how welcoming western audiences were to anything considered Turkish. This lot is the invention of this era, when an already prosperous company took advantage of the rage for 'turquerie' and created a product that it was certain to capture the attention of its wealthy clientele. This prayer rug of Ottoman style was sure to enchant those patrons who were used to the clearly European sensibility of the Rococo and Neoclassicism and who would have been eager to follow the newest trends and purchase such a whimsical and fashionable conversation piece. The uniqueness of this rug is just as captivating as it was at the time of its creation and just as then, today it would fit well with both eighteenth century decorative arts and a collection of genuine Ottoman prayer rugs.

CATALOGUE NOTE

The design here of hooked, stepped "Memling" guls supported by diagonally striped columns punctuated by diamonds is shared with Moghan weavings such as the Ritman long rug, sold Sotheby's London, 18 October 1995, lot 41; a rug published by Eberhart Herrmann, *Asistische Teppich-und Textilkunst*, v. 3, Munich, 1991, pl. 33; another in Heinrich Kirchheim et al., *Orient Stars*, Stuttgart and London, 1993, p. 15, p. 49; and one in James D. Burns, *The Caucasus: Traditions in Weaving*, Seattle, 1987, pl. 30. Here, as in the Burns, Ritman and Kirchheim pieces, the ivory ground is a perfect foil for the brilliant and varied colors employed in the design. The yellow border of the present rug is shared with the Kirchheim example, however, its hooked design motifs differ from the examples cited and are found in other Kazak rugs, such as Eberhart Herrmann, *Kaukasische Teppichkunst*, Munich, 1993, pl. 40. In near original condition, the present rug exhibits the lustrous wool and brilliant color that characterize the best Caucasian weavings.

This finely woven, silk foundation rug is one referred to by Ralph Kaffel as belonging "...to a small, elite family of very finely woven lattice pattern rugs, usually atttributed to Marasali. Rugs in this group feature rows of flowers arranged in sequence to form a 'V' pattern. The depiction of some of those flowers is usually natrualistic, and red silk is often used in the pile. Yellow is used in greater proportions than in similar white-ground lattice pieces." See Ralph Kaffel, *Caucasian Prayer Rugs*, London, 1998, pl. 94, p. 150. The other known related examples are a piece dated 1230 (1814) formerly in the Yale University Art Gallery, now in the collection of James D. The large knot structure of this rug is most similar to Ming lion-dog carpets such as the Clark, Abadjian and Edin carpets, see Michael Franses, *Lion-dogs, Hundred Antiques: Classical Chinese carpets I*, London, 2000, pls. 1, 2, 3 and for the Clark and Edin carpets, *Glanz der Himmelssohne: Kaiserliche Teppiche aus China 1400-1750*, London 2005, pls. 61 and 62. In the example offered here, the lion-dog features the curly mane found on the Edin beasts, however the facial expression here is much less fierce than on any of the Ming carpets. The stance and cheerful demeanor of this lion-dog more closely resembles those of Kanghxi period (1662-1772) rugs, such as Franses, *op.cit.*, figs. 15, 16, 17.

The two medallion composition here appears to be more unusual than either the single medallion or triple medallion format in Khotan carpets. 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

CATALOGUE NOTE

Almost all wool Heriz weavings can be characterized by a rectilinear medallion design that has changed little over time, symmetrical knotting, relatively low knot density, and the dominance of madder and indigo colors punctuated with yellows, browns and sometimes occasional greens. Pieces from the mid and late nineteenth century tend to have particularly attractive color palettes that, while often saturated or brilliant, are never harsh. Brilliant coloring is one of the few characteristics wool and silk weavings from Heriz share. As exemplified on the piece offered here, silk weavings attributed to Heriz have soft yet saturated hues that make up a fine and harmonious color palette. Just like the lot offered here, Heriz silk rugs are always extremely pliable and, unlike their woolen counterparts, finely woven. In many ways, Heriz silk rugs resemble silks produced in nearby Tabriz. Some suggest that, because of their shared design characteristics with Tabriz silks, these finely-woven pieces cannot be attributed to Heriz with certainty, see Murray L. Eiland Jr. and Murray Eiland III, Oriental Carpets, London, 1998, p. 93. Medallions, floral patterns, inscription cartouches, and figural elements, most often drawn with grace in a curvilinear fashion, are all commonly used in Heriz silk rugs and carpets, such as the ones sold Carpets from the Estate of Vojtech Blau, Sotheby's New York, December 14, 2006, lots 14 and 90. The lot offered here is unusual for a Heriz weaving as its central design elements differ from the traditional Heriz canon. The peculiar, almost figurative, design outlining a naturalistically drawn tree under the mihrab arch makes this lot a unique piece whose curious inscription reading there are many Satans disguised as humans, therefore, you need not shake everyone's hand, render this lot even more distinctive. Regardless of the unusual design and ominous inscription, the extremely high quality of workmanship and brilliant color palette attest to the mastery of weavers from the Heriz area.





CATALOGUE NOTE

The tradition of English needlepoint-making predates this lot by centuries. The art of embroidery had been practiced in England since the earliest days of British history but it was not until the early to mid-sixteenth century that needlepoint was introduced to the British Isles from Flanders. While early English needlepoint textiles clearly reflect Italian Renaissance influences, local craftsmen quickly developed their own distinctive English style that drew inspiration from other continental schools. Needlepoint at the time was used as table covers, on articles of clothing and as furniture trimmings. By the early seventeenth century English ateliers established their own design canons and used color combinations typical to their work. The most commonly used colors were greens, blues, yellows and deep brick reds. Because English embroiderers were fortunate to have access to some of the highest-quality wool in Europe, their products became highly desirable all over the continent. In the seventeenth century, unlike in the early 1800s and later, needlepoint "carpets" were most often used on tables and were placed on the floor only in the most lavish homes. Because of its relatively small size, the lot offered here was also most likely used as table decoration with the field area precisely covering the top of the table. The central medallion showing an arrangement of fruits and vegetables could also suggest that this piece was intended to be used as a table carpet showing a vessel filled richly with the bounties of the Earth. The slightly angular, yet naturalistic depiction of these flowers, fruits and vegetables are typical to the era and can be found in contemporaneous works such as the Hulse carpet, see M. J. Majorcas, English Needlework Carpets, Leaigh-on-Sea, 1963, pl. 12. In spite of the angular nature of the flora shown, the overall design with its strap work, plump flower heads and lush leaves adds an unmistakably Baroque sensibility to this lot, making it particularly lavish and luxurious in appearance.



CATALOGUE NOTE

With the defeat of Ibrahim Shah Lodi, the last ruler of the Delhi Sultanate, in 1526 at the battle of Panipat by the Timurid prince Babur, the Mughal Empire was founded and a new era in the history of the Indian subcontinent began. The new ruling class introduced a wide range of innovations derived from Safavid Persian art. Unquestionably, one the most significant of them all was the establishment of an enduring and well-functioning carpet-weaving industry that produced outstanding textiles which became an essential component of the arts of India for centuries to come. The early weavers of Indian carpets were strongly influenced by Persian models and regularly turned to Safavid examples to create their own weavings. The adaptation, or often direct replication, of Persian artistic formulas in sixteenth-century India however was a general characteristic of the decorative arts and architecture and was not restricted to carpet weaving. Indian court carpet production is thought to date from the reign of the Mughal emperor Akbar (r. 1556 1605) when, though designs were based upon contemporaneous Persian models, carpets started to exhibit a distinctively Indian style. Even with the emergence of an inimitable Indian aesthetic, certain Persian design elements, themes and compositional preferences were retained by local carpet weavers. Such analogies include the use of vivid color palettes, the fondness for animal depiction and the abundant use of interlacing vines, large palmettes and delicate flower heads. In fact, the classical Persian carpets most in vogue at the Indian Court under the Mughal dynasty were decorated with scenes of animals and gardens and were often referred to as 'Paradise Garden' or 'Hunting' carpets. An excellent example of an early Indian 'Paradise Garden' carpet was sold Carpets from the Estate of Vojtech Blau, Sotheby's New York, December 14, 2006, lot 54. From the mid-seventeenth century, as a result of Shah Jahan's (r. 1628 1666) enthusiasm for European herbaria, Indian carpets became increasingly more floral in design, exhibiting more botanical realism. By the mid-1700s, as the Mughal Court transferred its economic and political focus from Persia to its new trading allies, the Western European powers such as Holland and England, it replaced the Safavid design ethos with a more European aesthetic that resulted in generally more regulated, less organic compositions and stylized design elements. For a mid-eighteenth century carpet from the Deccan decorated with such stylized motifs arranged in a controlled geometric order, see Daniel Walker, Flowers Underfoot, New York, 1997, p. 140. The mid-eighteenth century also brought the decline of the Mughal Empire after the Persian invasion of India in 1738 and with it a decrease in carpet production due to the almost complete lack of court commissions. Workshops around the country, and particularly in the northern territories where the lot offered here was woven, were supported almost entirely by the British East India Company and to some extent the invading Persians. It is most probable this lot is the product of this era and was likely to have been woven at around 1800 as a foreign commission. The design of this carpet is clearly copying Safavid models with the composition's symmetry along a central vertical axis and jewel-like colors superimposed on a rich burgundy ground. The theme of this lot is that of the abovementioned garden carpets that were so highly valued in both Persia and India in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. Even though this carpet is the work of Indian craftsmen and at first it might appear as an Indian garden carpet from the Jahangir period (1605 - 1627), the subtle differences in design suggest that the weaver followed Persian and not Indian prototypes. The cypress trees on each side of the field clearly derive from Persian models and can be found on numerous Safavid rugs, such as a garden carpet dating from the sixteenth or seventeenth century now in the Philadelphia Museum of Fine Arts, see Susan Day, et al, Great Carpets of the World, New York and Paris, 1996, p. 147. The symmetrical placement of lions along a central axis accentuated by flora is also a Safavid motif and, among other pieces, can be found in a sixteenth-century fragmentary carpet from Kirman, now in the State Hermitage Museum, St. Petersburg, see Arthur Upham Pope, A Survey of Persian Art, Volume XII, Tehran, p. 1204. The animal figures, though common in both Persian and Indian carpets, also appear more Safavid having been executed with great detail and a naturalism that is seldom found in Indian carpets other than those copying Persian prototypes in the times of the first Mughal emperors. Here the animals are surrounded by gracefully and naturalistically drawn trees that are hallmarks of early Persian garden carpets. The multi-colored palmettes gracing the field are also more Persian in appearance with their rounded edges. Palmettes and leaves decorating Indian pieces most often have finely serrated sides, pointed tips and flame-like shapes that are atypical to Persian works. The white flower heads sprinkled over the field here, on the other hand, are far too stylized for a typical early Indian carpet that, as mentioned above, depicted flowers with great botanical accuracy. This, again, suggests that the weaver of this carpet aimed to execute a piece in the Persian style. The unusually powerful and wide border of the lot offered here also recalls Persian models with its interlaced arabesque design and is

comparable to a border fragment now in the Burrell Collection, Glasgow Art Gallery and Museum, see May H. Beattie, *Carpets of Central Persia*, Kent, 1976, p. 68, fig. 39, and a 'Vase' carpet fragment in the Victoria and Albert Museum, London, see Pope, *op. cit.*, p. 1220. Possibly based on an existing Persian cartoon or even an original Safavid carpet, this carpet could have been commissioned by a western trader for the European market or a Qajar client at a time when sixteenth and seventeenth-century Safavid art was held in particularly high esteem in Persia and works of art from that period were in great demand. Regardless of the original owner, this piece is an outstanding piece of textile art that successfully recalls the golden age of Safavid Persia in India.



CATALOGUE NOTE

Marjorie Merriweather Post was an iconic socialite of the 1920s and 1930s and her homes, including the Mar-A-Lago estate in Palm Beach and Hillwood House in Washington, D.C., were among the most revered hubs for the upper classes. Born in 1887 in Springfield, Illinois, Ms. Post was the only child of C.W. Post, founder of Postum Cereal Company, a leader in the manufacturing of breakfast cereals and coffee substitutes. In 1905 Marjorie married Edward Close, a lawyer from a prominent family in Greenwich, Connecticut. Upon her father's death just nine years later, Ms. Post became the sole shareholder of Postum and one of the richest women in the country, with a wealth of some \$20,000,000. Even before Marjorie came into her large inheritance, she travelled extensively and frequently. Probably the now-most-well-known destination of her travels was Palm Beach, Florida. At the time Palm Beach was nothing more than a small overgrown island, which remained an obscure resort until the completion of the Florida East Coast Railroad. Soon after the completion of the railroad, wealthy northeasterners, including Post, began their trips to Palm Beach, often in the comfort of their private rail cars. When in 1920 Marjorie divorced Mr. Close and married E.F. Hutton, Jr., a talented, successful and social businessman, the trips to Palm Beach became increasingly frequent. In 1924 the couple purchased a 17 acre parcel on the Atlantic Ocean and commissioned the architect Marion Sims Wyeth, an American whose oeuvre reflected the already-established Spanish colonial taste of Palm Beach, and Josef Urban, a noted Austrian architect who had previously worked for the Imperial Court in Vienna. These eminent architects were hired to design a sufficiently grand residence for the extravagant Huttons. By the mid-1920s the couple owned numerous lavish residences and large estates throughout the United States. Throughout her life Marjorie Post worked with numerous designers, such as Franz Barwig, and used the services of an overwhelming selection of firms, including French & Company and Edward F. Caldwell & Co. in New York, but always had considerable influence over the projects. For example, the concept of decorating each room in a different style clearly came from her as it appears in some of her mostloved homes such as Hillwood in Washington, D.C. and Mar-A-Lago in Palm Beach, where the interior decoration of the her bedrooms were identical. The carpet offered here was used by Ms. Post in the dining room at Mar-A-Lago and was later moved to Hillwood House in Washington, D. C. After Ms. Post's divorce from Mr. Hutton in 1935 she married Joseph Davies, a Washington lawyer, and began spending less time in Florida and more on her other estates in the north. Hillwood in Washington D.C. was one of her favorite homes where she stored her large collection of Russian works of art that she had acquired while spending time in Moscow in the late 1930s, when her new husband was appointed U.S. ambassador to the Soviet Union. Marjorie remained an avid collector and patron until her death in 1972 and constantly updated the interiors of her homes, including Hillwood and Mar-A-Lago, by enlisting the services of some of the most prominent firms and purchasing items from well-known dealers and auction houses such as Parke-Bernet Galleries, the predecessor of Sotheby's in the United States.



CATALOGUE NOTE

The design of the carpet offered here demonstrates the revival of interest in Safavid art that occured during the Qajar period (1794-1925) in Persia. Here, a vinery lattice is punctuated by bold palmettes, flowering shrubs, and the occasional vase, in a rendition of a Safavid 'vase' carpet design. Central Persian carpets with the 'vase' technique, woven during the height of the Safavid empire in the 17th century, often featured this pattern, with examples including the "Jeziorak" 'vase' carpet now in the Thyssen-Bornemisza collection, see Friedrich Spuhler, *The Thyssen-Bornemisza Collection: Carpets and Textiles*, London, 1998, pl. 27, pp. 116-119; the Lady Baillie 'vase' carpet, sold Christie's London, 14 October 2004, lot 100; and the 'vase' carpet in the Victoria and Albert Museum, see Arthur U. Pope, *A Survey of Persian Art*, pl. 1227. The bold curling leaves in the carpet offered here appear on a smaller group of Safavid 'vase' technique carpets with the most notable examples being the carpets in the Corcoran Museum of Art, Washington, D.C. and the Gulbenkian Museum, Lisbon, see respectively May H. Beattie, *Carpets of Central Persia*, Westerham, 1976, pl. 6 and Richard Ettinghausen, et al, *Persian Art: Calouste Gulbenkian Collection*, Lisbon, 1985, pl. 30. Here, the classic design elements are rendered in a more subdued color palette to complement Qajar and Western interiors.




